Fall 2009 Credit Student Enrollment Change Analysis
September 28, 2009
Executive Summary

The Fall 2009 census headcount of 8,201 students sets a new record high enrollment for Mountain View College. This is 15% (1,056) more students than Fall 2008, and the fourth record breaking enrollment since Fall 2006.

Unduplicated Student Headcount Highlights

- All ethnic groups increased in number. The largest percentage increases were Asian students who increased 29% (+92), and Black students who increased 26% (+472)
- Students in age group 26-30 years increased 30% (+250) over Fall 2008, followed by 51 years and older increasing 24%, and 41-45 years increasing 21%
- Full-time students increased to 26% of all students in Fall 2009
- First-Time-in-College (FTIC) students number 1,183 (86 more than Fall 2008)
- 43% (3,541) of Fall 2009 students returned from the Spring 2009 semester compared to 37% returning in Fall 2008 and 35% in Fall 2007
 - 49% of Fall 2009 Hispanic and Asian students returned from the Spring 2009 semester compared to 39% of White students and 36% of Black students returning
- Undecided majors who make up 46% (3,737) of all students, and Liberal Arts and Sciences majors who make up 36% (2,927) are the only two groups that increased over Fall 2008. All other majors decreased and collectively equal 18%
- The top five high schools in terms of recent graduates enrolled at MVC are South Grand Prairie, Duncanville, Moises Molina, Sunset, and Grand Prairie
- Total students (not including dual-credit) receiving financial aid increased 21% from 1,402 to 1,689 individual students. An additional 771 students received dual credit or ECHS waivers
 - These 2,460 individual students are collectively receiving 3,110 awards that total \$3,369,765 in financial aid
 - The largest increases were in Federal Pell Grants; Texas Grants, and dual credit and ECHS tuition waivers
- Students residing in MVC service area ZIP codes make up 73% of the student body
 - Students residing in Duncanville increased 53% (+287) over Fall 2008, followed by Dallas service area ZIP codes +15%, Grand Prairie +8%, and Cedar Hill +6%

Duplicated Student Course Enrollments Highlights

As of census day Fall 2009, there were 20,041 duplicated student course enrollments. This is 13% (2,274) higher than in Fall 2008 at census day.

Schedule Type:

- The following schedule types account for 100% of MVC's student course enrollments
 - Weekday mornings – 42%
 - Weekday evenings – 22%
 - Weekday afternoons – 12%
 - Online – 12%
 - Dual Credit – 5%
 - Weekend – 3%
 - Self Paced – 3%
 - Hybrid – 1%

Instructional Division:

- All Instructional Divisions are teaching more student course enrollments than they did in Fall 2008
 - Business, Computer Science, and Mathematics Division courses are experiencing the greatest growth +1,125 enrollments (+22%). The division's courses also make up 31% of the total course enrollments
 - Arts, Humanities, and Social Sciences Division comprise 29%
 - Communications and Teacher Education Division – 25%
 - Science, Allied Health, and Physical Education Division – 11%
 - HDEV courses 4%
 - MATH courses increased the most with 600 more enrollments, followed by: HDEV courses +370; CIT and ENGL courses increased 290 enrollments each; PSYC +180; and CHEM +150
